Student Induction

In the Summer Term of 2017 Eden Manchester's first cohort were invited to an induction day at Manchester City's football ground.

When we arrived we were greeted by our principal Mrs Merva and also our form tutors. Mrs Merva spoke to us about the expectations she had of us as students entering Eden Boys' Leadership Academy.

We then had a tour of the stadium, including the pitch and locker rooms, and we met a famous footballer called Kevin de Bruyne. We also got the opportunity to spend time on the under 11's pitch where we competed in form competitions.

We rounded off the action-packed day with an assembly where a star player in every form was handpicked by the MCFC coaches that had been refereeing our form games.



We officially started at Eden in September by taking part in a three week leadership programme. This involved us being based at **Manchester University** where we took part in different activities and learnt new skills. It also gave us a chance to meet other new students and start making new friendships.

We went on various trips including visits to **Manchester Art Gallery**, the **Museum of Science and Industry (MOSI)** and an action-packed day at the **Anderton Outdoor Centre** near Bolton. This was the most fun day as we got to try activities like abseiling, archery and other team-building skills. Apart from this we also had a competitive sports session at Goals in Cheetham Hill and even a workshop where we learnt circus skills!

To round off our sports leadership induction, we visited the National Football Museum in Manchester where, to our surprise, we met Juan Mata, the MUFC Midfielder.

Enrichment

At Eden Boys Manchester we have different enrichment activities running before, during and after school.

The school has formed a partnership with Manchester City Football Club to coach students every morning before the school day begins. MCFC coach Kieran who runs the sessions says he is impressed with both the boys' abilities and also their dedication for turning up to sessions at 7:30am on these cold autumnal mornings!

Some of the other enrichment clubs currently running at Eden Boys include:

Eco-club: students are learning about the environment and how to look after it.

The 'Quiet Room': gives students the opportunity to read, recharge and reflect.



Nasheed Choir: teaches pupils different Nasheeds and prepares them for performances in upcoming school events.

Film club: allows students to watch and review different films linked with curriculum learning.

Art and Photography Club: introduces students to different camera techniques and improves their artistic skills.





Open Evening

On Thursday 19th October 2017 Eden Manchester opened its doors for potential future students and their parents, with a great amount of hospitality.

Mrs Merva and our dedicated staff set a range of activities to make sure that this was an evening to remember. Some of the activities on the night included:

- In the hall the school's newly formed Nasheed Choir performed 'A is for Allah' and Mrs Merva delivered a welcoming speech. Guests were also treated to great Qur'anic recitation by students as well as some 'First impression' accounts of the school given by Eden's very first cohort.
- In the Science lab, Mrs Akhter demonstrated burning magnesium, whilst some students showed practicals with acid and alkalis. There were also kidneys and an animal heart on display which attracted quite a crowd! Mrs Tariq was also on hand with her friend George the skeleton, telling people what they could expect from their P.E lessons.
- In the Humanities department, Mrs Akhter and Miss Butt kept a room full of surprises. Visitors were invited to locate where they lived on a massive Ordnance Survey map and they were fascinated by the various models of places of worship as they circulated the room.
- In Art, Miss Krosschell had a hand-selected Autumn leaf collection, which gave the visitors an opportunity to use water colours to create some wonderful pieces of art.
- In French, Madame Aziz let visitors look at our French classwork whilst telling others of her lifetime experiences of living and working in France. Also Mr Afzal, our Assistant Head Teacher and Computer Science teacher, set up fun games on Kodu for visitors to enjoy.
- In Maths and English, visitors got a chance to view pupils' work and ask teachers any questions they had about the core subjects at a high school level.
- Last but not least, there was a student-led cake sale supported by Miss Shahbaz where we sold yummy cakes, sweet treats, savoury snacks and delicious drinks to raise money for the Rohingya Refugee Crisis.

Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day is a part of British life, culture and heritage, and as a school we participated in marking the event this year. Remembrance Day acknowledges the fallen soldiers of World War 1, World War 2 and other international conflicts.

To commemorate the occasion we made poppies in our Art lessons which we then sold. Under the guidance of Miss Krosschell we managed to make over a hundred poppies, and sold them to staff and fellow students during break and lunch. We then donated the money raised to charity.

Why do we wear the poppy?

During the First World War (1914 - 1918) much of Europe took part in fighting against Germany. Beautiful countryside's that were blasted, bombed and fought over had swiftly became a field of mud and barren scenes where little or nothing could grow. Yet, in the middle of the desolate land, thousands of delicate bright red poppies grew and flourished.

We wear poppies as they are the flowers which grew on the battlefields after the First World War ended. The Royal British Legion is the charity which runs the 'Poppy Appeal' each year and it gives the money to the service women and men who are still alive and whose lives have been changed by war.

Honesty is a vital characteristic in Islam, the world would be a horrifying scene if nobody was honest. The Prophet Muhammad (SAW) said: "Honesty leads to righteousness and righteousness leads to paradise." This Hadith shows how vital it is to be honest as it could help open the doors of heaven for you in the after-life.

Patience is one of the few keys to success. How do you deal with the obstacles that life throws in your way? Allah says, "Be patient! Allah is with the patient ones" This shows us that we should control our emotions and practise being patient.

Islam places much emphasis on how we treat our elders, including teachers, parents
and grandparents. It is important that we treat them in a respectable manner.
One hadith on respect is: "Whoever is not merciful to their youngsters and is not respectful to elders is not one of us."

"The heaviest deed in the scale of a believer will be that of good manners." Therefore our manners are a big part of getting to paradise. Our manners show a reflection of ourselves and our parents and it is important that we show good manners in all areas of our life: from the home to school to the outside world.

The Prophet (SAW) encouraged **smiling** as it is a form of charity. Even if he wasn't in the mood for it, he always had room for a smile. Smiling is sunnah (the way of the Prophet) in Islam and we should smile when we greet our peers and elders and well as guests. **Smiling is viewed across cultures as a sign of friendliness and it is a natural response that shares our happiness with others.** However did you know it also has health benefits too? Smiling lowers the heart rate and temporarily reduces blood pressure. It can also help reduce stress. So Smile – it is worth more than you know!




