We are already one term into our new academic year, so we decided to interview teachers who are new to Eden Boys' Leadership Academy to know about their experiences thus far. Read our interviews with the teachers below:

The first teacher we decided to interview was Miss Ilias, one of our new science teachers:



#### How has your experience been so far?

"It has been good. I have really enjoyed teaching and doing practical work with students. The staff are very welcoming and supportive. If you have any enquires or problems, any member of staff is always willing to help. I have thoroughly enjoyed this new experience and I am looking forward to the rest of the year.

#### Have you faced any new challenges?

This is my first time working with this curriculum, but I am enjoying it. Learning names has also been quite a challenge as I must learn new names for all the five years.

How would you rate your experience so far out of 10?

Overall, it is a solid 9/10.

The second teacher we decided to interview was Mr Webb, our new Geography teacher:



#### How has your experience been so far?

It has been different, as this is my first time working in an all-boys school, but it has been welcoming. A smaller school means everything is more accessible and it is easier to move around. At previous schools they have been a lot bigger therefore it can get difficult to manoeuvre across the school. Teachers are very friendly, and more importantly the students are



very welcoming, friendly and sociable which was great to see. Also, I've enjoyed managing football, during enrichment in years 9 and 10 – I have seen great ball skills.

#### Have you faced any new challenges?

An earlier start, and a slightly longer day but I am getting used to it. I also have more responsibilities in this school than in previous schools, e.g. enrichment at lunch times, which I enjoy.

### How would you rate your experience so far out of 10?

I would give my experience an 8/10 - it's been a very good start. All the teachers and students are very welcoming, and I look forward to what the rest of the year will bring.

Mr Webb's personal question to us was, 'Do you think there are more united or city fans?' Is that even a question to ask, of course Manchester United (although I may be biased)!

The third and final teacher we interviewed was Mr Anderson, our new English teacher:



#### How has your experience been so far?

I have enjoyed it a lot. This school has an exceptional learning environment - the children have been interested in English and extra-curricular activities – areat enthusiasm and buzz.

#### Have you faced any new challenges?

School days are a bit longer but we do have a shorter Friday which is a bonus. Enrichment and sports have been something new for me, but I'm really enjoying it. The school has a difference structure to the day, but it keeps everyone engaged, occupied and involved.

# Y9 Magnificent, Majestic Microscopes


### By Year 9 students

The students of Year 9 used light microscopes to examine onion cells.



The results were mind-blowing.


To do this, we used a simple method. The first step was to take an onion cell and place it carefully on the stage, staining it with iodine - this was to see the cell membrane. After this, we added another glass on top of the cell, sliding it under the objective lens and turning on the light which reflected off the mirror. However, we still couldn't see the cells so we had to zoom in and adjust the rough focusing knob, then the fine focusing knob whilst looking through the eyepiece to get a clear sight of the cell.



After completing the method, we all took a turn to look into the eyepiece, and it was amazing. It looked like a brick wall, with smooth edges, and big dots (nuclei) in each area. The iodine we added worked very well, as it helps us see what we couldn't see – the background of the cell. We could also see the different shapes; it was intricate and interesting.

We picked out some of the pupils that performed the experiment and asked them about their experience.

"When I looked through the eyepiece I was baffled, it looked a lot more realistic than the images shown to us by the teachers on the screens. It was like exploring a whole new world." – student response



"It was perplexing, we peeled off an extra-thin layer from the onion and gently placed it on a piece of glass, we then stained the layer of onion and then placed another piece of glass on top. We then slid it under the objective lens and turned the light on. At first, we couldn't see anything apart from a white light but as we turned the focus knobs the image became clearer, and we could see the cells and we were astounded." – student response

After the experiment, we wrote down in detail a report on what equipment we used, the method and our incredible findings. Many students who conducted it thought it was the best practical they have completed so far.



# Maritime and International Slavery Museum

Year 8s visited the Maritime Museum and International Slavery Museum in October 2021.



The trip to the international slavery museum was jam packed with a vast variety of activities. As soon as we arrived, we began exploring the bottom floor, which contained lots of information about the Titanic, its sinking and biographical details about the people on board. I had learnt a lot about the Titanic in school, and it was really interesting watching it all come to life by visiting the museum.



After completing the Titanic activity on the bottom floor, we all moved to the floor above.

Here, we were given a booklet with around 20 questions about slavery. The aim of the activity was to explore the 1<sup>st</sup> floor of the museum and find the answers to the questions, which were scattered at different locations. This enhanced our understanding of slavery.


### **Globetrotting to London**

Pupils took part in creative workshop around identity, investigated prominent black figures throughout history and had a special assembly from our guest speaker Dr Bell who is the founder of the Charity and a Deputy Lieutenant for Greater Manchester. History teacher Mr Brown's brother, Nathanial Brown - who is a Team GB wrestler - also sent our boys an inspirational video message.





#### Anti-bullying week

Anti-bullying week was celebrated at our school, led by our Anti Bullying ambassadors. To celebrate the theme of kindness a different kind word was shared with forms every day, all heads of years delivered a special assembly on the themes of kindness, and pupils shared kind messages with each other. They also took part in special friendship lessons during PSHE.



#### Children in Need

Over £1500 was raised for **Children in Need** in November and was led by the Anti Bullying Ambassadors who feel strongly about supporting children's charities.



Every day at break time, different treats were sold. On Friday, the school took part in a cultural food festival with staff and students donating food from different cultures that students were able to purchase in takeaway tubs. Zohaib Khalid in Year 10 and Harshil Sankhla in Year 7 dressed in bear costumes to collect money from parents in the morning as they dropped children off to school.



#### **Healthy Eating**

Four **Healthy Eating Ambassadors** were appointed this year to try to encourage boys to eat better. The boys, led by Ibrahim Khan in Year 8 have launched Wellbeing Wednesday. On this day every week they provide a range of free fruit at break time to the whole school.





The fruit is left in trays and the boys can help themselves. Their next ambition is to encourage boys to eat healthy snacks throughout the week. This half term they plan to launch a healthy eating form competition. They also have some additional fantastic ideas going forward.



#### Winter Gift Programme

Eden Boys took part in a range of activities to support the **Winter Gift programme**. Boys in Year 7 and 8 took part in a silent auction and raised over £500. This money was then used to purchase and pack more than 200 meals for a women's shelter.





In addition to these, hundreds of foodbank items were donated by forms across the school.

It was again another impressive year for form Winter gift hampers. Year 8 and Mr Nizam's form were particularly impressive with the quality and number of hampers produced. More than 40 hampers were donated in total and distributed across the local community, including shelters, hospitals and local businesses.

As part of their **Active Citizenship** all boys in Year 10 took part in a Citizenship Fair.




This involved them advocating an issue of their choice to their peers.

#### **Debate Mate**

On the 6<sup>th</sup> of November 2021, 13 students from year 10 were taken on a trip to the University of Manchester, to attend the Debate Mate launch.



Debate mate is a social mobility programme which aims to help students from disadvantaged backgrounds develop their speaking and presentation skills. Each week, mentors from the University of Manchester deliver sessions in school to help develop students' oracy and debating skills.

As students, we were given an unseen motion, that 'this house believes everyone should become vegan', and this was the statement we focussed on throughout the session. We were then divided into two teams, the proposition and the opposition. Each team was comprised of four speakers, with the first speaker responsible for defining the motion and proposing their side of the argument.

When defining the motion, the speaker has to consider what the motion is, who it will affect and how it will affect them. We were also taught how to formally argue against a point: this is termed a rebuttal and every speaker must provide a point of

rebuttal against the speaker who spoke prior to them in order to gain maximum points.

During the middle of a debate, each side can pose a question in response to a point made by the opposing team; this is known as a point of information.

The speaker then has the choice to either accept or decline these questions.

On our arrival, we were welcomed by a group of mentors who asked whether any of us had taken part in the core programme before.

As I had completed the programme before, I was asked to take part in a debate in front of all the schools participating in the launch and I was placed on the proposition team; I was therefore to present arguments agreeing with the motive.

Another one of our students, Haaris Sarfraz, was called to the front and was to clap after the first 30 seconds and before the last 30.

I was the 3<sup>rd</sup> speaker, and the subjects I focused on included the effects healthy eating has on our wellbeing and how slaughtering animals is an ethical issue.

Before the final speakers presented, the debate was opened to the floor. One of our own students, Khaled Itani, took to the floor by posing a question to the opposition. These questions were then answered by the final summary speakers in their speeches.

Overall, it was an extremely engaging and insightful day and has given us all a small taster of what is to come for myself and the other pupils who will be completing the 17 week core programme.

Pupils were first inducted into the school and introduced to each other. They also met their form tutor. Each form group then carried out an orienteering exercise of the school building to help familiarise themselves for the start of the term.



A range of activities were organised for Year 7 pupils and it goes without saying that the inter-form football competition where matches were played on a daily basis in the afternoon was extremely popular.



All year 7 pupils started on their spirituality enrichment lessons which made them understand some key basic fundamentals such as how to make wudhu, the timings for all 5 prayers with a focus on Zhur and Asr given these prayers are prayed in school

during the winter months. Pupils were also shown the wudu and prayer facilities and prayed in congregation everyday during summer school.

"It is a hierarchy system, so at the top of the hierarchy we have the STEM ambassador. Then we have the STEM leaders and then the STEM champions underneath them.




Umar, a STEM champion, explained some of the things he does:

"We've also been working with electrical circuits and created methane bubbles which you light to create a burst of fire."






Head of Science Ms Greenwood commented:






# First Inter-Eden Football Tournament


### 4 Caliphs Mastermind


Eden Boys' held their 3<sup>rd</sup> annual Mastermind competition to teach students about the life and leadership of the first 4 Caliphs.

The competition was fierce this year, with students showing amazing feats of memory as they competed to become the Mastermind champion.

Mastermind began with all students watching 7 video presentations on the lives and leadership of the 4 caliphs during form time. Students listened with rapt attention, as one-by-one, each of the videos revealed more and more information about the amazing feats of the 4 calips. Once the video presentation series was complete, the videos were made available on the school YouTube channel, and students were given a few days to revise them.



Thereafter, the whole school, of 620 students, took part in a whole-school multiple choice quiz, answering 30 multiple-choice questions on the 4 caliphs. The answers were then auto-marked using optical mark recognition (OMR), and the top 3 then moved on to the next round.




In round 2, the top 3 from each of the 21 forms were quizzed verbally for 1 minute on the lives of the 4 caliphs, and the top 2 students from each year then qualified for the grand final.

The grand final was live-streamed through YouTube to the whole school. All teachers were sent a YouTube livestream link, and at 8:05 on Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> November, the final began, with FCE lead Mr Limbada asking each student a different set of questions for 2 minutes.

The studio was the drama room on the top floor, where a microphone and camera were set up for livestreaming the event.





Competition was fierce, but in the end, year 8 student Ibraheem Ahmed, the final contestant, answered 26 questions correctly in just 2 minutes to be crowned Eden 2021 Mastermind champion.



We caught up with him, to get his thoughts on his victory. He told us, "I really enjoyed Mastermind. I would like to thank my form tutor Ms Lim, who supported me by uploading all the videos to Microsoft Teams so I was able to revise from the very beginning. It really helped, and when the final was due to take place, I was really confident as I put a lot of effort in."

The finalists all received a beautiful finalist certificate, and Champion Ibraheem Ahmed also received a Mastermind trophy and £100 Amazon voucher.

Under his leadership Eden Boys School opened in 2014 and quickly became one of the borough's most outstanding schools, as graded by Ofsted and also its GCSE and A-level results.

In 2019, Eden Boys' School was placed top of the school league table in Bolton, with a staggering 90 per cent achieving the gold standard in GCSEs.

The school's progress score saw it named in the top 70 schools nationally.

Mr Fazal, a qualified physics teacher, is currently executive principal at Eden Boys' Leadership Academy, Manchester and Eden Girls' Leadership Academy, Manchester.

All schools are part of Star Academies, a trust which is set to open a secondary school in Radcliffe, the first high school in the town for many years."
